Proposed Changes to Sec. 6-2 - Definitions

Boutique Package Sales Endorsement

- Allows existing on-site consumption licensees with goods for sale (clothes, gifts, etc.) to also sell alcohol for off premises consumption (allows for only 5% of total sales)
- Downtown core/Downtown fringe to sell, for example, drink mixes with accompanying liquor or cocktail gift sets

Proposed Changes to Sec. 6-2 - Definitions

Brewery/Brewpub and Craft Brewery

Currently a brewery or brewpub is only allowed to sell beer they produce onpremises. This modification would encourage cooperation between businesses by allowing a brewery or brewpub to also highlight and help promote craft beer or cider from another brewery.

Proposed Changes to Sec. 6-2 - Definitions
BYOB (bring your own bottle) Endorsement

Currently available option for businesses licensed for on-site consumption

Reinforces that BYOB is NOT allowed without an underlying liquor license

Proposed Changes to Sec. 6-2 - Definitions

- Liquor Store/Full Liquor Store License
 - Clarifies the language and requirements for a full liquor store. Itemizes requirements to qualify for a full liquor store license.
 - Adds E-Commerce Delivery Store as qualifying to carry a full range of alcoholic liquor for sale.

- Proposed Changes to Sec. 6-4 License Required
 - Any "Sale" of alcohol requires a liquor license
 - There is a common misconception that if a business is giving away alcohol, they do not need a liquor license. Sale (as defined in the Code) is added:
 - Sell, Give Away, Dispense, Provide Mix, Ice, Water or Glasses, Pour, Provide Setups, and Store any Alcoholic Liquor

- Proposed Changes to Sec. 6-10 BYOB Endorsement
 - Clarifies the requirements and application process for a BYOB Endorsement
 - Specifies that BYOB is for beer and wine only and not all alcoholic liquor

Proposed Changes to Sec. 6-13(c) - Allowed Areas

Corrects language from "special use permit" to "conditional use permit" when referencing the permission received to obtain a liquor license within 500 feet of a residential property through the administrative review hearing process. This is in line with the language updated in the Zoning Ordinance

Proposed Changes to Sec. 6-28 - Hours of Operation

- (a) Clarifying language and the modification of Sunday on-site consumption hours from noon to 9:00 a.m. with the service of food
 - Removes former section (2) that allowed for brunch hours for on-site consumption licensees on Sundays beginning at 10:00 a.m. (p 8 lines 3-6)
 - Allows businesses to accommodate earlier brunch hours and customers who arrive early for Sunday sporting events
- (b) Clarifying language only regarding off-site consumption/package sales hours.

Proposed Changes to Sec. 6-28 - Hours of Operation

(d) Casino Facilities are required to comply with the State of Illinois Liquor Control Act and Illinois Gaming Board Rules. The Liquor Control Act 235 ILCS 5/6-30 gives the Illinois Gaming Board exclusive authority to establish hours for sale and consumption of alcoholic liquor in a casino.

(p 7 - lines 4-8)

Proposed Changes to Sec. 6-28 - Hours of Operation

(e) New Year's Eve/Day Extension of Business Hours

- Currently may automatically remain open until 2 am on New Year's Eve/Day
- Currently may apply to extend hours from 2 am 4 am on New Year's Eve/Day
- Proposed changes clarify language

(page 7 - lines 10-32)

- Proposed Changes to Sec. 6-28 Hours of Operation
 - (f) Discretionary Extension of Business Hours for Special Days
 - Modify current practice of allowing additional extended hours for only St. Patrick's Day and Cinco de Mayo
 - Allow businesses to celebrate a more diverse set of special days by allowing the choice of two (2) "Special Days" per year (excluding New Year's Eve)
