City of Aurora, IL Increasing Public Use of Wilder Promenade

The Wilder Promenade project is the third major step in the City of Aurora's years-long effort to improve the quality of the Fox River and the Fox River shoreline in Aurora's downtown, and to make the shoreline area more inviting for use by our residents.

Wilder Promenade will connect two open spaces along the western shoreline of the river. With the environmental improvements planned, the park will become a welcoming site for residents to relax and enjoy the outdoors, as well as a spot for community festivals, art shows, farmers markets and other activities that will draw visitors to the park and the shores of the Fox.

The total estimated cost of our project is \$871,100.

We are seeking an OSLAD grant for \$400,000, with general City funds covering the remaining \$471,100 of the cost.

The single largest cost in the project budget is \$250,000, for the construction of a restroom facility on the site. The building also will include a small concessions area, and a stairway leading up to the roof of the building, where residents will be able to gather for an evening enjoying the outdoors, and perhaps listening to the concerts being held across the Fox River at the RiverEdge Park music venue.

The other major costs are \$120,000 to relocate the utilities now running through the site, and the costs of several items involved in removing the city street which now runs through the middle of the two sections which make up the park. The street costs include \$7,500 for curb removal, \$19,800 for roadway removal, \$30,000 for grading, and a total of \$143,300 for turning the street into a pathway through the park, made of permeable pavers. We will install about 14 retractable bollards around the site, which can easily be removed to allow entry by emergency vehicles. Cost of the bollards is estimated at \$10,500.

The permeable pavers are one of several environmentally conscious improvements being made at the park. We also will create a 10,000-square-foot bioswale to limit any danger from any runoff from the site into the Fox River. The cost of seeding the site is estimated at \$10,000, and plantings of perennials, trees and shrubs over the entire park area has a combined cost of \$110,000.

There is an additional \$80,000 cost in consultant fees for design, archaeological and environmental reports.

All of the cost estimates are based on City discussions with contractors, consultants, and suppliers over the past two years.





A. OBJECTIVES AND NEED FOR ASSISTANCE -- The City of Aurora's project for Increasing Public Use of Wilder Promenade would turn a presently little-used downtown park into a space that will attract thousands of residents each year for entertainment and relaxation. Wilder Promenade is the third element of an 8-year, multi-million-dollar effort to improve the east and west shorelines along the Fox River in downtown Aurora.

B. RESULTS / BENEFITS EXPECTED -- What is now called Wilder Park is actually two open spaces, covering 3.5 acres, divided by a city street. Our proposal for OSLAD funding would involve removing the paved street and making improvements that will create an inviting space that will attract patrons to the park from all segments of our community. Aurora's 201,000 residents are 43% Hispanic, \$39% White, 9% Black and 7% Asian. At this time, we are considering making the space available for Aurora's Farmers Market (the oldest Farmers Market in Illinois), art shows, community festivals and other activities.

C. APPROACH – We will remove the street pavement and replace it with permeable pavers, making it an attractive, inviting and environmentally beneficial pathway through the park. A new bioswale will improve run-off to the Fox River, and trees, perennials and shrubs will be planted to create a pleasant park environment. We will install a restroom and small concession stand building for use by the thousands of people attending events at the park.

In 2019, a pedestrian/bike bridge spanning the Fox River from the Wilder Promenade on the west shoreline to RiverEdge Park on the east will be competed, linking the east and west branches of the Fox River Trail. With this link for the trails, and the availability of restrooms and concessions, Wilder Promenade will become a trailhead for the west branch of the Fox River Trail, which stretches 60 miles from Wisconsin to Oswego, just south of Aurora, and sees an estimated 50,000 users each year.

D. GEOGRAPHIC LOCATION – Wilder Park is on the north edge of downtown Aurora, with Illinois Route 31 (Lake Street) forming its western border and the Fox River as its eastern border. Directly across the Fox River from Wilder Promenade is Aurora's new RiverEdge Park, which has had more than 100,000 visitors each year at its John C. Dunham Pavilion concert site, and the many celebrations held at the park. RiverEdge Park and the pedestrian/bike bridge over the Fox River linking Wilder Promenade with RiverEdge are the other two elements of Aurora's longterm effort to improve the environment and increase the use of the shorelines of the Fox River near downtown.

E. PREVIOUS ASSISTANCE -- Wilder Promenade has not received any previous assistance.





Wilder Promenade is a 3.5-acre parcel which is divided into two open space areas by a one-block stretch of city street. Closing the street, removing the pavement and replacing it with permeable pavers -- and taking the other actions in our proposal -- will create one large park area, with amenities now absent from the site. The improved space will draw residents from throughout the Aurora area to art shows, community festivals, farmers markets and other activities at the park, which also will serve as a prime viewing spot for Aurora's annual Fourth of July Fireworks show along the Fox River.

The eastern parcel borders on the Fox River, and a section of the 60-mile west branch of the Fox River Trail runs along the river shoreline. The proposed improvements will make Wilder Promenade a trailhead for the Fox River Trail, and serve as the site where a new bike/pedestrian bridge can bring users of the west branch of the trail over to the east branch, on the eastern shoreline of the Fox River near downtown Aurora.

Both parcels now are basically grass-covered, with a few trees, a few benches, and no structures on the property.





Each session consisted of a presentation followed by openquestion and answerperiods. Participants in each session were assigned "homework" at the conclusion of each session. The homework consisted of questions to determine a ranking of project elements and to elicit comment on their importance and relevance to the project. The responses were returned to the City and compiled by the Park Collaborative. Examples of each meeting's agenda, presentation materials, and homework assignments are included with the appendix to this master plan.

Upon completion of the working sessions, the master plan entered the charrette process, allowing all stakeholders to have hands-on participation and discussion about specific

design characteristics of the elements that were refined during the working sessions. The master plan was divided into five areas that include:

- Wilder Park / West River Edge
- River Crossing / Blues Island Preserve
- Garden Market and Event Space
- Outdoor Performance Venue and Lawn
- Indian Creek Wetland / Environmental Center

Each of these areas were discussed in detail with working groups consisting of five to seven stakeholders, input was collected by group leaders and each participant completed a charrette "passport" that posed questions, ranked project elements, and provided space for comment. The results of the passports were tabulated and used to determine final project elements and programming needs.

Lastly, the Park Collaborative conducted the required pre-application and regulatory guideline meetings for the project with the Illinois Department of Natural Resources (IDNR) and the U.S. Army Corp of Engineers (ACOE). The project elements, determined by way of

the design competition, working sessions, and charrette process were presented to each agency to determine appropriateness of use and if they were allowable under current permitting law. The Park Collaborative prepared a "Permitting Strategy" that would be the basis of the permit submittal for the project. Preliminary engineering plans for the portion of the master plan that could be constructed in a three to five-year time frame were prepared and submitted to the regulatory agencies to begin the permit process. A detailed explanation of the permitting strategy and the work included in the three to five-year plan (Phase I Plan) can be found in the "Permitting Strategy and Phasing" section of the Master Plan.

The design process for the master plan was conducted between May and October of 2007 and resulted in the following items:







EXISTING CONTEXT

The proposed park site is a historically significant location within the 170-mile long Fox River watershed. The famed Potowatomi Chief Waubonsie settled nearby, coming to the river to hunt the rich forested banks and marshy pools at the outflow of nearby creeks. This site is also where the river islands of the Fox provided the physiographic location and water power to run the McCarty brothers' milling and manufacturing operations on the banks of the Fox River. This historic settlement eventually led to the incorporation of Aurora in 1857.

The park site is bisected by the Fox River and surrounded on three sides by major north-south andeast-westtrafficcorridorsconnectingthrough the downtown area to all sections of the city and


EXISTING SITE

nearby communities. Residential neighborhoods exist blocks from the river's edge to the east and to the west, but are poorly connected to the river and the downtown business district. The land, much of which lies in a floodplain, slopes down to the river on both sides with varying grades and steepness. Historical land uses include parking, commercial and industrial sites, and open space. Environmental remediation will be part of the park development.

As a place owing its very existence to the Fox River, this land represents a major opportunity for Aurora. The site is conveniently located adjacent to the City's historic downtown business district, the Aurora Transportation Center, the Hollywood Casino, and the Paramount Arts Center.

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


E BRIDGE

This important pedestrian bridge unites the city by connecting the east and west sides of the fox River. Convenient bicycle/pedestrian access to the Aurora Transportation Center is made possible. The bridge provides a natural vantage point from which people can watch festivals and river activities, or simply stroll along to enjoy the view. The bridge is a dramatic focal point for the park and the city. Its curving form embraces the river, drawing attention to the water. Its singlemasted cable suspension system is a unique landmark, juxtaposed against the backdrop of the Aurora skylline.

The bridge becomes a symbol of Aurora's historic heritage as "The City of Lights" when dramatic evening displays illuminate both the bridge and the water in a union of nature and technology.

At the center of this iconic bridge is a natural sanctuary called Blues Island. After extensive restoration efforts, the island has become a unique urban wildlife habitat, viewable but inaccessible to people.

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


