- Program Name:

Education Summer Camp

- Describe program staff and qualifications.

Each site will operate with at least five adult staff members and at least 8 to 10 high school and college students working as assistants. All sites will have school personnel in charge of the site. Each site will have at least one certified teacher and four additional professional adults, with at least one staff member affiliated with the site. Staff will take care of logistics of the building and ensure compliance with state standards and requirements.

- Describe staff to client ratios.

Each site will have the capacity to enroll 100 elementary students with a staff to student ratio of 1:10. There are at least 10 staff members at each site to keep the ratio of 1:10, excluding the Site Coordinator.

- Program Description (Include dates, times and location).

The City of Aurora (COA) Education Summer Camp program will operate Monday – Thursday from 8:30 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. at Georgetown Elementary in Indian Prairies School District 204, and at Wheatlands or Homestead Elementary in Community School District 308. It will operate from 8:30 to 2:00 Monday-Friday in District 129 (Site TBD) and Fred Rodgers Magnet School in District 131. East Aurora School District schools will operate three half day afternoon camps and West Aurora will operate two full day camps in the month of June incorporating their summer learning program. All of these camps will follow same basic format of City camps.

At the four City camp sites, FVPD will offer weekly fitness programming; SciTech will provide Science workshops; Aurora Arts Initiative will provide weekly arts activities and Brad Smith will teach fourth and fifth graders chess. The COA will provide field trips to all camps. Each camp site will work with CIS to determine the field trips they will take. They may go to museums in Chicago, or go to Phillips Park, Blackberry Farm, Splash Country or Phillips Park Aquatics center. CIS will provide all students participating in camp with information regarding the Back To School Fair so they can receive school supplies and a back pack in order to be ready for the first day of school. The CIS community partners will be able to provide the following as an integral part of the Education Summer Camp.

- Fox Valley Park District will provide fitness activities.

- Scitech will provide Science workshops at City camp sites.
- Aurora Arts Initiative will provide weekly arts activities.
- Brad Smith will teach chess to four and fifth graders attending City camps.
- School districts will provide facilities, recruitment of participants, and aid in recruitment of school staff to work in the summer program.
- Sodexo will provide breakfast and lunch for East and West School Districts;
Northern Illinois Food Bank will provide breakfast and lunch for Indian Prairie and District 308.
