Substantial Amendment 2021-#3 Executive Summary

Substantial Amendment 2021-#3 proposes amendments to the following documents:

• Substantial Amendments to 2018, 2020, and 2021 Annual Action Plans

As an entitlement community, the City of Aurora, Illinois ("City") receives funding from U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) through the Community Development Block Grant Program (CDBG), HOME (HOME) Investment Partnerships Program, and Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) Program. More recently, funds were appropriated under section 3205 of the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 (P.L. 117-2) ("ARP") for the HOME Investment Partnerships Program (HOME) to provide homelessness assistance and supportive services. On March 11, 2021, President Biden signed ARP into law, which provides over \$1.9 trillion in relief to address the continued impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on the economy, public health, State and local governments, individuals, and businesses. The ARP authorized HUD to allocate HOME-ARP funds to states, units of general local government, insular areas, and consortia of units of general local government that qualified for an allocation of HOME funds in Fiscal Year (FY) 2021. In keeping with this authorization, the City was notified of its \$2,726,703 HOME-ARP allocation on September 22, 2021. This Substantial Amendment will result in the allocation of the HOME-ARP funds and approximately \$112,000 of unexpended 2020 CDBG funds and the associated adjustments needed to ensure the integrity of the City's spending obligations and also further address the City's effort to comply with HUD's regulatory requirements in administering the City's CDBG and HOME-ARP Programs.

Upon closure of the public comment period and receipt of City Council approval, all proposed amended and new activities together with their proposed funding will be entered into the applicable sections within HUD's e-Con Planning Suite Reporting System.
