I'm Pat Kelsey with WBK. We're the Civil Engineers for the project.

I'm Pat Callahan with Studio GC, the Architects for the Project.

I'm Pat Dacy with the School District.

Mr. Callahan said the addition of Freeman goes, or at least it was decided to be placed at the south end of the east wing, the east north/south wing. There will be a new entry to the school, a visitor entry, at grade level. Currently the school is not handicap accessible to the office area. So there will be an easternmost entrance off of Randall Road. A new office space will be created and also a new gymnasium space with some interior renovations. The siting of it places it virtually over the blacktop in the rear with a little bit on the west end side over the playground area. The total addition is about 9,600 square feet. It is a 2 story volume, but it is actually a stair tower 2 story. The remainder is one 1 story.

Mr. Sieben said there was no change to the existing playground or the paved area. Do you want to just clarify that grey area?

Mr. Kelsey said there is some additional impervious surface. The existing playground that is being covered actually has asphalt underneath it, but there is some turf removal to the Glenwood Place side and we'll still be way under 25,000 square feet, but we'll be about 12,000 square feet total and then the new playground will be a mulched playground on the existing turf location.

Mr. Callahan said the playground that you see out there now is actually a raised playground. It has a perimeter that sits on the asphalt and the wood chips are inside of it.

Mr. Wiet said are you doing anything with the windows on the existing Freeman? Are you replacing those or opening them up?

Mr. Callahan said the only windows on the existing building right now that will change will be the windows in the current gymnasium, the tall windows because that renovated area is going to be turned into classroom space, so those windows are the old Kalwall, which the old version of the Kalwall kind of that milky white fiberglass is changed color, but that's the only one where we will be physically changing the windows.

Mr. Feltman said we talked about this, I believe, but just on record, the way the stormwater control ordinance reads is it is 25,000 in aggregate, so this would be tallied up and if you ever had any other additional parking or anything you could end up going over that 25,000, but you are good right now.

Mr. Kelsey said and the other two will be the same. That will change when we come back, but today, all three are the same.

Mrs. Vacek said I will be getting formatting comments out, but I didn't really see anything major with this one.

Mr. Wiet said maybe just to clarify, are all the windows going to be shaded kind of from view the way like the old ones are? Is that the plan for the new?

Mr. Callahan said the box on the left hand side, the majority of that addition is the new gym. The new gym will have windows in it. It is kind of like West High, that milk white Kalwall, which is the diffused light, so the gymnasium will have a diffused light and no direct glass.

Mr. Wiet said but the classroom windows are going to remain?

Mr. Callahan said correct. Those kind of tall skinny windows are the Kalwall windows. They show up as black in the rendering, and then the actual windows on the east elevation on the bottom, those windows to the right are existing. The windows to the left will be new, but those will obviously be clear glass windows.

Mr. Wiet said you are replacing some in clear. You know what I mean is that the rest of the windows are all blocked off from sunlight.

Mr. Callahan said back in the 1980's under Energy Conservation rules, they took the glass out and put in the Kalwall as an attempt to try to mitigate that. We don't have resources to do all of them, but the ones that will be done will be clear glass in the existing gym elevations.

Mr. Wiet said I can understand for a gymnasium for that.

Mr. Krientz said I'll have a couple of comments. I looked over the plan. I had a question. Are you fencing any of the area as far as getting to the building or access anywhere?

Mr. Callahan said we haven't discussed that at this point, I don't believe.

Mr. Krientz said I just want you to be aware that we'll need a lock box if new fencing goes up so we have access to it. Was this one of the structures that was going to get sprinklered or not?

Mr. Callahan said this one does get sprinkled yes.

Mr. Krientz said we'll have some dialogue on that. A couple of them are sprinklered and a couple of them aren't.

Mr. Callahan said the 7,200 square feet is kind of the, when we get to McCleery, I'll explain why we are sprinklering because there is already a sprinkler line that we are cutting right through so we are just going to tap it.

Mr. Krientz said for Freeman are you making any of the existing building harder to access?

Mr. Callahan said no. We're actually improving it to a certain extent. The back stairwell will come off, the existing stairwell that's on the back side. We'll be creating a new stairwell that will go all three levels with an adjacent elevator, so we are going to make the building accessible, so we are actually going to improve the circulation of the building.

Mr. Krientz said I just wanted to make sure that the apparatus lanes stayed intact. That was all I had on this one.

Mr. Feltman said this isn't a new fire service line they are proposing. They are just coming off the

Mr. Callahan said well this building is not sprinklered right now.

Mr. Feltman said so this is going to require a new tap?

Mr. Callahan said correct.

9 The school is actually built in 1928.

There was a ten-room addition that was 11 constructed in 1951 and then renovations were 12 performed in 1976 and 2003. The present capacity 13 of the school is 492 students, not including the two double classroom mobile units currently in 14 15 use. The current enrollment of the school is 569 16 students; therefore, the building addition is to accommodate the needed classrooms in hope of 17 18 eliminating the mobile units from the site. They 19 are requesting to construct a 9,550 square foot building addition which will include classrooms 20 21 and other related educational facilities at the 22 south side of the east wing of the school to 23 accommodate the enrollment that is at the school 24 right now, and they are hoping to eliminate the 0018 mobile units from the site. 2 With that, the Petitioner is here so I can turn it over if you have any questions unless you 3 4 have questions for me. 5 MS. TRUAX: Any questions for Tracey? 6 MR. ENGEN: I will have to abstain 7 when we get to voting because of my connection 8 with the school district being employed with 9 10 MS. TRUAX: Okay. We will note that. 11 Does the Petitioner want to come forward? 12 (Whereupon, the witnesses were 13 duly sworn.) 14 15 STUART WHITT. 16 called as a witness herein, testified as follows: 17 MR. WHITT: Good evening. My name is 18 Stuart Whitt. My address is 70 South 19 Constitution Drive, Aurora, Illinois, 60506. I am an attorney for the West Aurora School 20 21 District Board of Education, School District 129, 22 and the Petitioner in this matter, which involves 23 the proposed addition and renovations to Freeman 24 Elementary School, located at 153 South Randall 0019 Road in Aurora. 1 2 With me this evening is Pat Dacy, the 3 School District's Capital Projects Manager and 4 Dr. Jeff Craig, District Superintendent. 5 Dr. Craig will be making a brief statement 6 this evening. He will be followed by Patrick 7 Kelsey, a principal at the engineering firm of 8 Wills Burke Kelsey Associates, who will discuss 9 the final Plan for this project. Mr. Kelsey will 10 then be followed by Mr. Pat Callahan, a principal at Studio GC, Inc., and lead architect for this 11 project, who will discuss the architectural 12 13 plans. 14 And then if you have any questions we will 15 attempt to answer them as best we are able. Thank you. Dr. Craig? 16 17 DR. JEFF CRAIG 18 called as a witness herein, testified as follows:

DR. CRAIG: My name is Jeff Craig.

- My address is 80 South River Street in Aurora,
- 21 60506. Very briefly, we are here tonight to
- 22 present three of our projects, the first being
- 23 Freeman Elementary School.
- 24 As you know, the public spoke loudly and

- very definitively last April with a Tyler 1
- 2 Referendum vote. These are tax dollars. We are
- committed to responding to the desires of the
- community. And the community and the school
- 5 share a mutual interest in eliminating the mobile
- 6 classrooms at Freeman Elementary and this project

7 attends to that issue.

PATRICK KELSEY 9 called as a witness herein, testified as follows:

10 MR. KELSEY: Pat Kelsey, 8 East

Galena Boulevard, Suite 402, Aurora, Illinois.

The final plan is up on the board and you

13 have it in front of you.

14 Freeman Elementary sits on a property that

15 is four acres in size. And with the addition and

the addition of some additional paved activity 16

area that is shown in the gray hatch and a 17

building addition in the darker gray, the total

19 lot coverage will be 87,537 square feet or about

20 50 percent lot coverage.

21 So this small school site will remain

22 50 percent open space going into the future and

23 be able to remove the mobile classrooms. There

have been no improvements to Freeman Elementary

- that increased the lot coverage since the storm
- water ordinance went into effect in 2001. So the
- total new lot -- the total new impervious surface
- would be 21,356 square feet, under the 25,000

5 square foot threshold. So no additional storm 6 water detention is required by this.

7 We are managing the storm water in a manner

8 that will not increase the off-site flows by

q utilizing every opportunity we have to infiltrate

10 water on the property in order to not increase

off-site flows in this neighborhood.

12 Additionally, if you look at the site plan, 13 there are no proposed improvements to public

14 rights of way in this project.

PATRICK CALLAHAN

15 16 called as a witness herein, testified as follows:

MR. CALLAHAN: Good evening. Pat

18 Callahan, 223 West Jackson Boulevard, Chicago,

19 Illinois, 60606.

20 I'd like to discuss the evening the scope

21 of the architectural elements of the project. As

22 was indicated earlier, the project is about 9,540

23 square feet of addition, located on the southeast

corner of the existing facility. The project

0022

- will encompass renovations to the interior
- portions of the building for classroom space as

well as gymnasium space.

4 The elevations of the building are intended 5 to be masonry in construction and brick matches 6 will be made to match the existing structure. 7 Our objective is to keep the addition somewhat 8 simple and modest for two reasons: Number one, 9 obviously being good stewards of tax dollars; and number two, making sure that the facility, 10 11 itself, has good long-term maintenance cycles for the school district.

12 13 The additions, the elevations you see, will encompass not only brick masonry but also 14 15 windows, new windows, in the addition, as well as 16 some replaced windows in the current east side of 17 the building where the existing gymnasium is. 18 Some of those windows have darkened over the years and that area will be renovated and 19 20 those windows will be replaced in that area. 21 The east elevation located on the screen in 22 the lower left-hand corner, we will actually be 23 improving the facility and the use of the

24 facility in that the new main entry will be at

grade level. So the facility in its totality 1 2 will finally be handicap accessible.

3 Obviously built in the early 1900s, there 4 were many level changes and this addition 5 accomplishes the ability for the building to be 6 ADA compliant but also to have a grade-level entry for visitors and parents on the east side located on Randall Road, as you can see in 8 9 eastern elevation.

The landscape plan that you see before you is really intended to provide a balance of two things: One is modest landscaping to ensure that we are not expending a great deal of district resources maintaining plant materials, investing that in the educational process, but recognize that it's important to be a good neighbor and sit nicely in context on the site. And so you will notice that we are proposing some foundation plantings as well as some new trees located on the existing site primarily on the east side.

21 All other elevations or other faces of the 22 facility will face what we call the recess or 23 playground zone of the facility. And currently

those areas are difficult during snow times for

plantings to survive because they are used a 1 2 great deal of the year.

3 We will entertain any questions if you have 4 them.

5 MR. BERGERON: Always with Jefferson, 6 traffic on dismissal has always been a problem. You're increasing the population of the school. 8 Is anything being done to control the traffic? 9

It's horrendous.

10 MR. CALLAHAN: You said Jefferson. You meant Freeman? 11

MR. BERGERON: Freeman. I apologize.

MR. CALLAHAN: At this time the 13 14 student population on site is intended to absorb 15 the existing students in the mobile classrooms. While we are building some additional capacity in 16 the facility, when this work is complete, at that 17 18 time there will be roughly the same number of 19 students on site. 20 While we recognize that there are certain 21 traffic issues along Randall Road of pickup and 22 drop off, the District is working on 23 administrative plans to try and simplify and minimize its impact on the neighbors during the 24

early morning hours and the afternoon hours.
 But at this point the amount of students
 and staff at that site will remain roughly the
 same.

5 MR. BERGERON: I'm thinking with 6 Aurora University expanding, it is really a 7 bottleneck in there and there is kids floating 8 all over the place. I am surprised no one has 9 been hurt.

MS. TRUAX: The playground. Is the playground remaining intact?

11 12 MR. CALLAHAN: The playground will be 13 relocated. Portions of it will be no longer 14 usable during construction. They will be relocated and reconfigured after construction so 15 that all the play apparatus will remain on the 16 property. And the additional hard surface, 17 recess, or play area that we are proposing 18 19 offsets the areas under which the addition is 20 going to sit on the hard surface play areas so we 21 are trying to keep that in balance for the 22 current student population. 23

MS. TRUAX: So it will end up being the same size?

MR. CALLAHAN: It will be a little 1 2 bit reconfigured when we are finished. 3 MS. TRUAX: And the other question I have is about the chain-link fence, especially to 4 5 the west of the Freeman playground. That is in 6 pretty bad shape. Is that an element that's going to be taken care of? I mean it caves in in 8 a few places and looks pretty bad. 9

9 MR. CALLAHAN: I'll let Dr. Craig 10 answer that.

DR. CRAIG: Those are great questions, the traffic and the fences. And we are trying to attend to a lot of it. We have an aging infrastructure. This is a 1928 building. It's a young pup compared to some of our other buildings in our district.

17 But, yes, we are trying to attend to as 18 many of those aesthetic pieces and functional 19 pieces, whether it's parking lot, whether it's 20 traffic movement.

21 And we will be talking a little more about 22 that in our future projects. But we realize that

we have some challenges. Freeman is one of those sites. It's landlocked and there's not a whole 0027 of places we can go. 1 2 I mean parking is a challenge. If you have 3 ever been there for a play or musical you're walking. So we plan for that. As far as the 5 fence, yes, we will try to attend to that. It's part of our preventative maintenance program. And so it's on our radar. But right now these projects are what we promised our community and 9 this is what they voted for. 10 And one of the promises I made to them is 11 we weren't going to deviate from that. And we are going to do what we said we're going to do. 12 We're going to try to attend to places, like the 13 14 fence, to other preventative maintenance 15 programs. 16 Does that make sense? 17 MS. TRUAX: It does. It's a shame to 18 have a beautiful new addition on what is actually a beautiful old school and have to walk down 19 there and look at it. Have you walked down 21 there? And to have to walk down and see the 22 fence, it makes it look very different than I 23 think the District probably wants it to look. 24 DR. CRAIG: We agree. We are going 0028 to continue to work on that. 1 2 MR. REYNOLDS: I don't have a 3 question. But on a positive note, I think within the last few years they have got sidewalks 5 finally, which I think is a tremendous addition because I have six grandchildren and many of them 6 7 I dropped off there. 8 And I didn't find the traffic as bad as I 9 thought it would be. I think your staff, the 10 staff at Freeman, have done a tremendous job in getting kids into the classroom and out of the 11 cars quickly and safely. Like you said, you're 12 landlocked, and there is not a lot you can do. 13 14 But to me, it's a great asset to the 15 neighborhood. 16 DR. CRAIG: They have a great 17 process. Thank you for your comments. 18 MS. TRUAX: Other questions? This is 19 a public hearing. So if there are those in the 20 audience who want to ask a question or make a 21 comment, we will ask you to come forward now. 22 We will swear you in and ask you to sign 23 out sheet 24 0029 1 (Whereupon, the witness was duly 2 sworn.) 3 MS. It's difficult to see, other than through the administration of the school, how you can do anything else with the streets than what has already been done. 6 No. 7: Does the proposed Special Use 8 conform in all other respects to the applicable regulations of the zoning district in which it is located except as such regulations are modified pursuant to the Planning Commission 12 recommendations? I believe it does conform to applicable 13 14 regulations. 15 Those are the Findings of Facts. Tracey, can you tell us where this is going? 16 MS.
