OUR HISTORY




Our first school sites were established and the new building on 355 Dundee opened.

Elgin Clubhouse was renovated to serve hot meals. 2 more school sites were opened for a total of 6 sites and 300 youth per day.

The Club expanded into Streamwood and began planning for a new facility in South Elgin.

The Club continues to expand to serve youth who need us most in new communities. In SY24 the Club is offered in 35 sites serving over 1,500 youth per day.



Plans to turn the little house with limited capacity into a brand-new state of the art facility that could serve 200 youth per day.

Three more school sites were opened for a total of 4 sites. 250 youth were being served per day.

The Club opened 4 new elementary sites and doubled the number of youth being served everyday.

Pandemic hits and operations change. Club stays open to serve essential workers and support Distance Learning in 10 sites.






Aurora Footprint

- 2022-23 school year: Aurora programming began under the leadership of Boys & Girls Clubs of North Central Illinois (BGCNCIL) after a grassroots coalition of local community members presented a compelling case for support to Boys & Girls Clubs of America regarding local need and opportunity.
- **Key partners**: In partnership with West Aurora SD129, and with the support of partners like the City of Aurora, AWEF and CFFRV, 4 school-based programs began, serving Aurora area youth daily.
- Current services: We now operate 8 Aurora area sites, including a new partnership with Waubonsee Community College, aimed at removing childcare as a barrier to higher education and training.
- **New partnerships**: We've welcomed new opportunities with organizations like Aurora University, bringing social work services to youth across our region.
- Our Moonshot: BGCNCIL has launched a "Moonshot," our bold vision to serve 10,000 youth at 100 sites in the next 1000 days, across our region to fulfil unmet need for enriching, affordable programming.
- Exciting growth is ahead for Aurora! Local and national Boys & Girls Club leaders recognize Aurora as a vital hub in our expansion efforts to break the cycle of youth poverty. By reaching more children and families with essential programs, we're creating brighter futures and stronger communities.

SAFETY POLICIES & PROCEDURES

- Alignment with Boys & Girls Clubs of America and Illinois Department of Human Services for all safety protocols
- Criminal background checks including fingerprinting for all employees and volunteers with regular, recurrent contact with youth members
- All employees CPR & First Aid trained
- Standard protocol for reporting and addressing critical incidents
- Required safety training for all employees
 - Child Abuse Prevention
 - Mandated Reporting
 - Grooming Prevention
 - Review of Safety Policies restroom use, one-on-one policy, off-site supervision, etc.
- New Employee Orientation for all employees to highlight expectations as a Youth Development Professional






COMMITMENT

LEADERSHIP MODEL

- Regional Director Oversees all operations and collaborates with community stakeholders
 - Area Manager Leads several Club Sites, ensuring a strong partnership and successful Club operations
 - Site Coordinator Supports a team of 2-5 Youth
 Development Assistants, responsible for the day-to-day operations of a Club program with a focus on safety protocols
 - Assistant Site Coordinator Ensures implementation of daily program calendar, supports with behavior response plans, data entry into MyClubHub platform
 - Youth Development Assistant Implements programs with a group of 15-20 youth







PARTNER COLLABORATION



- Access to program spaces with a capacity to serve at least 100 youth each day
- Consideration of meal program partnership to provide youth with nutritious meals
- Opportunities to engage families and youth for recruitment purposes
- Invitation to meet with other key stakeholders in partnership
 - Educate stakeholders about Club programs
 - Connect youth with Club opportunities
