Education Summer Camp

• Describe program staff and qualifications.

Each site will operate with at least six adult staff members and at least 10-12 high school and college students working as assistants. All sites will have either agency or school personnel in charge of the site. Each site will have at least one certified teacher and five additional professional adults, with at least one staff member affiliated with the site. Staff will take care of logistics of the building and ensure compliance with state standards and requirements.

• Describe staff to client ratios.

Each site will have the capacity to enroll 100 elementary students with a staff to student ratio of 1:10. There are at least 10 staff members at each site to keep the ratio of 1:10, excluding the Site Coordinator.

• Program Description (Include dates, times and location).

The City of Aurora (COA) Education Summer Camp program will operate Monday — Thursday from 8:30 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. at Georgetown Elementary in Indian Prairies School District 204, Homestead Elementary in Community School District 308 and Fred Rodgers Magnet School in District 131. The City will also fund Drama Camp operated by Fox Valley Park District. At the same period of time East Aurora School District schools will operate 13 half day afternoon camps following the in the elementary schools and West Aurora will operate two full day camps in the month of June incorporating their summer learning program. All of these camps will follow same basic format of City camps. East Aurora School District will also offer Leadership Camps at Cowherd, Simmons and Waldo Middle Schools.

The COA will provide four field trips to all camps. Each camp site will work with CIS to determine the field trips they will take. They may visit Aurora Airport, go to museums in Chicago, attend the play put on by COA/FVPD Drama Camp go to Phillips Park, Blackberry Farm and Splash Country or Phillips Park Aquatics center. Triple Threat will collaborate and provide weekly Sparq Fitness Program, FVPD will offer weekly arts and drama programming. SciTech will provide Science workshops and Brad Smith will teach four and fifth graders chess. CIS will provide all students participating in camp with information

regarding the Back To School Fair so they can receive school supplies and a back pack in order to be ready for the first day of school. (Also see Exhibit 1 below.)

The CIS community partners will be able to provide the following as an integral part of the Education Summer Camp.
