

Aurora A Vision for the Future

Executive Summary

- The Boys & Girls Club seeks to build a 45,000 SF clubhouse on the East Side of Aurora.
- The space will serve approximately 450 K-12 youth/day
- Programming M-F after school, 8 AM 7 PM in summer, FREE OF CHARGE
- The space will be open to all Aurora youth, regardless of home school district, and complement existing programming on the West Side of Aurora.
- Administrative operations will be centralized with the Boys & Girls Club of Elgin, the umbrella organization for a 6-City service region and current footprint of 34 operating sites, and include a local staff comprising of a 1:15 ratio
- Building signage will note "Boys & Girls Club of Aurora"
- Construction/FFE estimated at \$18,000,000
- Fundraising strategy will encompass private and government grant writing, corporate donations, and individual donations

Mission

To enable all young people, especially those who need us most, to realize their full potential as productive, responsible, caring citizens.

Our daily programming focuses on three key areas: **academics**, **healthy lifestyles**, and **character** and **leadership**. This daily engagement is called the *Club experience*, which is made up of five key elements:

- Safe, Positive Environment: Club staff, programs, and age-appropriate settings create stability, consistency, and a sense of physical and emotional safety for members. The Club provides structure and clearly defines acceptable behaviors.
- Fun: BGCE generates fun for its members. Members develop a strong sense of belonging through connections they establish with staff and peers. Staff members make the Club feel at home, fostering a family atmosphere and creating a sense of ownership for members.
- Supportive Relationships: Club youth develop meaningful relationships with adults and their peers. Staff members actively
 encourage such relationships. Staff members display warmth, caring, appreciation, acceptance, and guidance in their
 interactions with members.
- Opportunities and Expectations: Club youth acquire physical, social, technological, artistic, and life skills. Clubs encourage
 members to develop a moral character while reinforcing high expectations and helping members with school and post-secondary
 education.
- Recognition: Clubs recognize and support young people's self-worth and accomplishments. Staff members encourage youth
 and provide positive reinforcement as they make improvements and experience success. The Club showcases young people's
 achievements.

Impact & Outcomes

90% of Club Members expect to graduate high school on time, and 76% expect to complete some kind of post-secondary education.

100% of Member parents would recommend the Club to other parents, and 92% of Member parents said they would "very much" recommend the Club to other parents.

100% of Member parents say the Club is a safe place for their children to learn, grow and have fun.

99% of Member parents feel that the Club staff care about their child.

98 % of Member parents say the Club promotes positive values and behavior.

95% of Member parents are always satisfied with the variety of activities offered at the Club.

81% of parents said the Club is "very much" helping my child with school.

90% of youth are on track to graduate

75% of youth test at or above grade level in both reading and math

90% of youth participate in Workforce Development programs to prepare them for post-secondary life.

75% of youth volunteer or participate in Club-based service

90% of youth feel like they can stand up for what is right, even if their friends disagree

80% of youth regularly practice habits of physical wellbeing

95% of youth avoid risky behaviors (smoking, alcohol, marijuana, fighting, etc)

70% of youth report having the skills to be able to cope with challenges




